Joe has enriched my life in so many ways and beyond measure.

When thinking about Joe's appeal for commutation on his sentence, I want it for him. Commutation is something I want for myself, too. I know that when most people think about a pardon or commutation of a prison sentence that it only benefits the prisoner. It's not him alone that benefits; commutation can serve more than just the prisoner. It is farreaching beyond prison walls.



I love him very much and want him to be free to come home. Having spent time with Joe under all circumstances, he has proven to be kind, loyal, loving, and stable. He has only gotten better. And, with every passing year together, we have both grown and gotten better. Being married to Joe is my primary relationship in life. He's my closest friend and partner. My life would be measurably a lot happier if you let him out.

Governor Newsom, you are a powerful man and have the ability to set things right. It is my greatest wish and desire for Joe's request for a commutation of his prison sentence to be granted. Just the opposite, he has demonstrated an inclination toward helping people, such as his fellow inmates, to better their circumstances by turning their lives around through spiritual and or religious pursuits, education, healthy choices, life skills, etc. Whenever I visit Joe, someone will comment on what a good man he is, including a few of the C.O.'s as well as other prisoners. He has a strong moral compass and family values. He might only have a few years left and I believe that he has proven he would be a benefit to his spiritual community, and I know he would be to me.

My name is Michael Olivier. I am a retired technology executive based in Silicon Valley and Nevada City, CA. I am married to Katherine Olivier, the sister of Joe Hunt, and I have known Joe for 27 years. We are members of Ananda Church of Self-Realization, a community of spiritual seekers around the world who use meditation, devotion, right action, and selfless service to grow closer to God.

I believe the value of incarceration diminishes over time and that no man or woman should be locked up forever, provided they exhibit good behavior. Fiscal responsibility to the taxpayers, compassion for the human condition, and common sense all lead one to conclude that rehabilitated, elderly inmates who have strong community backing should be released.

Joe Hunt is a good man who lost some very powerful people's money when he was under 25 years old. He has been caught up in a legal system that has treated him extremely unfairly for 35 years (see FreeJoeHunt.com for details). He has maintained an incredibly uplifted view of life, helped inmates with health and legal issues, helped Ananda church raise money, and built relationships with Ananda members. He has maintained a zero-violence record in the face of being housed at LA County Jail and three or more Level-Four facilities, which must put him in the top 1% of all California inmates. He has recently developed a serious heart condition and on top of that health concern now he is at high-risk for COVID-19.

It does not serve society to keep Joe Hunt locked up - it just wastes taxpayer money. If he is considered for parole and released, he would be welcomed with wide open arms by our Ananda worldwide community. My wife and I have substantial wealth due to Joe's financial advice, and will fully support him for the rest of his life, although I know he already has job offers pending his release and would have many ideas for how to make money to support himself and help Ananda.

Would you please give him a chance to be considered for release by the parole board?



I am so sorry to hear that Joe is experiencing heart failure especially under such grave conditions with inadequate healthcare. No surprise of course about the healthcare conditions and with the current pandemic this makes it worse than ever.

I have nothing but fond memories of Joe and yes the dates of marriage were indeed '93 to 2003. During the friendship and marriage with Joe I witnessed a gentle and enlightenment seeker who always wanted the best for everyone in life.

He was a friend to the inmates and to the people that surrounded him especially when there was a sense of harmony in mind and that we should all simply try and get along and support one another as people with no one better than the other (equal as beings on this planet together).

I witnessed his coming to the defense of others in the visiting room if an argument broke out within families nearby in order to de escalate any fighting or rude behavior as he was keenly aware that children were close and didn't want to have them involved in violent behavior. This was the reason the Chaplain requested Joe as an assistant for many years in the church at the prison. Joe had the support of Ananda of the Self-Realization Fellowship community and the heads of the community would visit Joe regularly and it was wonderful to have the prayer time with them and the kinship we all had together.

Our divorce was amicable and we parted friends. The split was my idea and yes, I wanted to have a life outside of going to the prison and the anguish it caused me. I hated seeing Joe under those conditions. It broke my heart.

Joe most certainly deserves his sentence commuted and as a result released and ultimately treated in a proper hospital so he can thrive again for the remainder of his life.
